

- Service delivery: Spending is not enough...or feasible within a hard budget constraint.


Because increasing spending is not enough...





Improving performance through transparency


Transparency and accountability matters: The Bangalore Citizens Report Card




Transparency and Competiveness are positively correlated




The Public Expenditure Tracking Survey in Uganda

2. What are the key questions for improved performance

Six perennial questions for improved performance

- 1. How can we create orderly and efficient government administration?
- 2. How can we get government closer to the people?
- 3. How can we make government more affordable?
- 4. How can we make government more honest?
- 5. How can we make government more responsive to citizens and businesses?
- 6. How can we make government perform better and deliver on our key objectives?

How have governments tried to address these questions – Attempts over time...

3. EU-Governance Convergence – How did it work and what can we learn from it?

• *EU experience:* Accession a forceful change maker for governance convergence

 Context: Already existing convergence instituted for several years with the "Single European Act", "internal market" (1986) and "the Maastrict Treaty" (political-judicial) in 1992, a very strong European Commission and political consensus of member countries.


Key themes in EU's governance convergence

 Regulatory convergence: e.g. consumer protection, environmental standards, labor standards etc.

• Judicial convergence: independence and integrity of judicial institution

• *Political* convergence


Grow it at home: ASEAN's starting point and a typology of convergence

- Regulatory governance: ASEAN Economic
 Community Blueprint
- Economic governance: **ASEAN Economic Community Blueprint**
- Service delivery governance: commit to public service charters
